Our hope is that the children, as they grow up, will be equipped with sufficient knowledge and capabilities to prevent them from ending up in situations like so many orphans in Kenya.

Latest news from S:t Christine School i Kabondo

A new thing in Kenya this year is that from the present school year (2016) the third semester is shorter. This means that all students in Kenya now have vacations during November and December and that the new school year starts in January as before. On January 8th I (Bitte Brask), chairperson of the Kisumu Association, Ulla Sturéus from the school board and Anders Jansson, chairperson of the Foundation, will visit the school. Seven other persons will join us on the trip, some of whom are new members visiting the school for the first time. I, Ulla and Anders will meet with the school staff and representatives from the Foundation in Kenya.

The computers on their way to the school

In our latest letter we pleaded for extra contributions to cover part of the costs for transporting 30 lap-top computers to the school, computers which the Association received as a gift from a business. Following the letter we were contacted by a man, who knew a man, who offered to take our computers with him to Kenya. He lives in Sweden, is married to a Kenyan woman and is engaged in and operating a school project in Kendu Bay in western Kenya. A container was ready to be shipped to this school and he offered to let our computers go in it at a cost of SEK 500 per computer, i.e. half the costs of the offer we got from a transport company we had contacted. He also offered to personally hand over the computers to David, the school's head master. Our call for contributions resulted in gifts covering half of the SEK 15 000, which was the transport cost in stead of SEK 30 000 asked by the transport companies. The board wants to express our sincere thanks to all, who in various ways helped us to send the computers. At the time of writing we know that the computers are expected to arrive at Christmas time. I hope that this plan holds, so that the computers will be in place in January, when school starts and the pupils come back.

Flea market in Skarpnäck and Fair Trade Christmas market in Norrköping

On November 30th a flea market was held in Skarpnäck's community center. We booked two tables and brought box-loads of various things. The business was so-and-so, but in a few hours we collected more than SEK 1 800.

On November 26 – 27th we participated for the second consecutive year in the Christmas market at Arbetets Museum (Museum of Work) in Norrköping. This market has a specific profile and the vendors are different non-profit associations and organizations, which are engaged in activities to create better conditions for people in different parts of the world. We offered both Kenyan gems, textiles and traditional Swedish Christmas decorations. A novelty for this year was quilted kettle-holders made from African fabric. The business was good, and at the end we found that the revenues amounted to SEK 5 800, which go in their entirety to the Association, i.e. the school.

Christmas gifts to the children at S:t Christine

Please think of the children at S:t Christine. The best gift for the children can be for instance a school uniform, school lunch, utensils or a contribution to the drama activities, in which the youngest children willingly participate and which were very successful in the last years. There is no room for drama in the school's budget, because we must prioritize teachers' salaries, school unforms etc. So please give some extra thoughts to the children now in the holiday season. The table gives examples of costs. Please note that they can shift a bit up and down depending on the exchange rates.
